

LETTER FROM PROGRAM DIRECTOR

The Clinical Mental Health Counseling Program continues to be strong and vibrant with the acquisition of CACREP accreditation and some important programmatic changes. We sent evidence of compliance of the one standard we were required to codify and operationalize and were granted full accreditation by CACREP.

Dr. Crystal Zanders is settling in very well and has been a wonderful addition to the program. She has brought fresh ideas and a wealth of contacts in her role as the clinical placement coordinator. She has taken the process of student logs for practicum and internship from a paper format to an online one. She is currently in the process of establishing a Chi Sigma Iota Honor Society at Trinity Christian College. She has also earned the respect and affection of the faculty, staff, and students with her warmth and professionalism.

We adjusted our curriculum to move the practicum/internship experience to the end of the program so students can engage in all necessary coursework to prepare them fully for



contact with clients. Students are also able to take the National Counselor Examination prior to finishing the program due to our accreditation. We have also added a new course titled Self-Care for Counselors to the curriculum that has been well-received by students. This course focuses on the need for students to provide self-care for themselves as well as to utilize it as an intervention for their clients.

CACREP requires we have three core counseling faculty, so we have instituted a search for an additional counseling educator. Please keep the administration, search committee, and applicants in your prayers as we move forward in this endeavor.

OVERALL PROGRAM UPDATES FROM 2023-2024

- Chi Sigma Iota Honor Program for counseling is being implemented here at Trinity. Dr. Zanders is leading the way and has begun the registration process. Applicants must have a GPA of 3.5 or better and have graduated from a CACREP accredited program. The name of our chapter is Theta Alpha Omega. Our first initiation ceremony will occur on December 12th. We currently have 13 students that have registered.
- We have had several students successfully complete the NCE exam while still enrolled in the program. This is a wonderful benefit of CACREP accreditation. The students studied hard and were very excited to graduate with their licensure already in hand. This led, in many cases, to immediate employment.
- We are currently interviewing candidates for the available position of CMHC faculty. This will bring our core faculty to three which is the minimum required by our accrediting body, CACREP.

This was the first group of students who were eligible to take the NCE licensure exam while still in the program. Of those who took the exam, students experienced a 66% pass rate.

Beth Woolf



PROGRAM ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION

Each year the faculty of the CMHC program undertake systematic evaluation of the program and its goals. Annually those findings are reviewed and adjustments made to the curriculum and training experiences based on our findings. During the past year we've been collecting data as part of our comprehensive program and student evaluation process.

Program Assessment and Evaluation

- 1. Students will articulate a professional identity as a Clinical Mental Health Counselor within the broader field of mental health practice.
- 2. Students will demonstrate the ability to integrate a faith perspective into the practice of counseling.
- 3. Students will demonstrate knowledge in the core counseling areas including ethics, multiculturalism, human development, career development, helping relationships, group work, assessment, and research.
- 4. Students will develop case conceptualizations resulting in treatment plans that integrate theoretical perspectives in counseling, research-based approaches, ethical decision making and social justice advocacy.
- 5. Students will deliver competent mental health services which attend to the developmental, multicultural, relational, and spiritual concerns of clients.

Assessment of Learning Outcomes

- 1. Data collected on PLO 1 suggests that overall, the program is meeting this outcome. Some missing data occurred due to changes in faculty. Our plan of action is to ensure that all data is collected in the upcoming year.
- 2. Data collected on PLO 2 suggest similar results as above. We will ensure that all data is collected for the upcoming academic year.
- 3. Data collected on PLO 3 shows that this outcome has been consistently met. Our plan is to maintain this current level of knowledge of the core areas of counseling.
- 4. Data collected on PLO 4 indicates that this outcome has consistently been met. This is a continuation of the success of the program at fostering this skill.
- 5. Data collected on PLO 5 indicates that the program is consistently meeting this goal. This suggests that counselors in training are successfully navigating their clinical experiences in preparation for entry into practice.

PROGRAM ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION CONTINUED

Assessment of Students

Students are assessed on Key Performance Indicators at multiple points within the program. Additionally, dispositional measures are used in the counseling skills, practicum, and internship courses to provide feedback.

Initial data tracks student performance, knowledge, skills, and dispositional factors. Annual student feedback memos include attention to these factors.

External Survey Collection

As a part of the multi-year program assessment process a site supervisor survey is conducted once every three years. In 2024 the survey was sent and completed by 2 site supervisors. Feedback from the survey provided the counseling faculty with the opportunity to evaluate the curriculum and assess the need for ongoing growth.
